BQYC members are to use the BQYC parking lot. Please carpool whenever possible on Wednesday & Friday nights. The city is anticipating up to 3 more inches of water into early June.

They're doing a laser-level survey this morning of the park & our parking lot for mapping info. The city does plan to keep Victoria Park docks open and will adjust and fortify the ramps as needed. Dock power will be on a dock-by-dock basis. South dock power has been shut off. PLEASE keep your wake to a


which may involve some gravel & boardwalks. Please help out if the call goes out for a work party.

TRADITION

The Sailpast tradition began at the first Yacht Club formed at Cowes in England 200 years ago. The membership at Cowes was primarily aristocratic & many were familiar with naval practice and tradition. Cowes Yacht Club subsequently changed its name to the Royal Yacht Squadron & certain social graces were added to the traditional naval practices.

The actual "review of the fleet" is steeped in more than 600 years of Royal Navy tradition and history and was introduced in Yacht clubs as a continuation of the naval habit of having Admirals (and/or Royalty) review the fleet on special occasions.

Protocol demanded that a flagship be anchored with the Admiral on the quarterdeck to receive & return the salute. Vessels sailed past, dipping their colours in salute, & with their captain also saluting with the ship's company standing at attention.

Our Yacht Club tradition is similar, except that the salute is received by the Commodore instead & the salute is delivered by the passing boat, if under sail, by luffing its jib, or, if under power, by dipping its ensign. All of the crew on the saluting boat stands at attention facing the Commodore, who is the only one to salute by hand.

They're also expected to achieve their Level 1/2 CanSail Instructor Certification prior to the summer.

Please get those remaining masts up before the water rises any higher! There is a two week difference in these photos & it is still rising.




Goose Nest, an annual appearance on the lawn, soon to be a pond for the gosling swim training. Thanks Wayne Peterson for the photo.
